

A.C.A. ANNOUNCES \$900 IN GRANTS

The awarding of the first 3 grant-in-aids was announced by the Guy D. Jordan Endowment Fund, established and administered by The American Cichlid Association (ACA), at their annual convention in Milwaukee.

Marcie Friedman, recipient of a \$500 award, is currently pursuing a doctoral degree at the University of California in Berkeley. She is studying the reproductive ecology of *Heros minckleyi*, the mojarra de Cuatro Cienegas. Friedman is the first person to attempt to understand the adaptive significance of *H. minckleyi's* exclusively maternal brood care. This will entail studying the fish in the field as well as laboratory experimentation to test specific hypotheses generated by the field data. Friedman is currently at Cuatro Cienegas. The support received from the Jordan Endowment will help cover the cost of this summer's work.

Axel Meyers, recipient of one of two \$200 awards, is a West German graduate student also pursuing his doctorate at Berkeley. Meyers is interested in the relationship between environmental factors, such as the availability of different types of prey and the development of food gathering structures in cichlid fishes. He plans on conducting detailed surveys of the potential prey base in the various Nicaraguan lakes inhabited by Heros cintrinellus and H. managuensis and testing these data against the observed variation in buccal and pharyngeal jaw morphology of the two species. Jordan support will enable Meyers to carry out field studies in Nicaragua this summer.

The second \$200 awardee is Peter Wimberger who is enrolled in a doctoral program at Cornell University. Wimberger is also interested in the way in which environment and genetic factors interact to produce the distinctive jaw structure of cichlids. Using Geophagus brasiliensis and G. steindachneri as subjects, he plans to compare developmental patterns, environmentally constrained, in substratum-spawning vs. mouthbrooding cichlids. He hypothesisizes that exposing young cichlids to various diets will result in a greater range of morphological change in jaw development among mouthbrooders than in substratum-spawners. Wimberger will use the Jordan aid to purchase apparatus.

The Endowment Fund was set up at the 1984 ACA convention in Dayton, Ohio following the late 1983 death of Guy D. Jordan, one of founders and guiding lights of the association. It was partially funded by donations from Jordan's family with additional contributions from ACA membership and allied businesses and hobby groups.

Awards can be made in two catagories: (1) Prospective awards based on submitted proposals of research on the family cichlidae and (2) Meritorious awards in recognition of accomplishment in the maintenance, breeding and care of cichlids (i.e. work already completed) to be selected from nominated candidates. All three awards made this year were in the first catagory - proposals submitted by researchers or students.

There were no nominations in the second catagory, hence no awards. This catagory was meant primarily for hobbyists and will require more widely spread dissemination of the fact of its existance before nominations will be forthcoming. The ACA encourages local hobby groups to consider nomination of members who have done serious, documented studies of the family *cichlidea*. Although all three awardees this year are members of ACA, membership is not a condition of eligibility for an award.



Yes Virginia - A Beginner's Abisto

Having tried to maintain specimens of the <u>Apistogramma</u> species whenever we were able to find them, we had drawn the conclusion that these fish were definitely not for the beginner. However, over the past two years, we have come to know a little character which we feel does fall into this category. This is the <u>Apistogramma catei</u>.

Over the past couple of years this species has been regularly available within the hobby. This availability in itself is unusual for Apistos. Although it has very little colour it is certainly worth attaining if you wish to try what we believe to be the easiest Apisto to maintain and breed.

The only colour to speak of is a little blue on the gill plate of the males. Their fins do get a little elongated and present a fairly nice lace pattern. The females are usually a touch smaller than the males and quite drab in their normal dress.

Although Apistogramma catei is not the first of the family that we have spawned it is certainly the easiest. We obtained four fry at an auction in March and it was one of those not so rare times when we the hobbyists had nothing at all to do with the spawning activity.

We had placed the young catei in a ten gallon tank with some Rasbora heteromorpha to grow up. As it was summer, the busiest time for us with shows and conventions we paid little attention to the tank other than feeding and water changes. They were fed the normal fish room fare of beef heart mixture, frozen brine shrimp and flakes with baby brine given to boost their growth whenever there was some available.

So you can imagine my suprise when siphoning the tank next door to see what appeared to be a female in brood care dress. She was absolutely striking with her bright yellow body with jet black markings. After searching the tank we found about fourteen fry gathered together in the top of a flower pot which is also home to an Amazon Sword plant. The female was madly protecting her brood from everyone in the tank.

As it was our first spawn of catei we siphoned most of the fry out to rear in a separate tank. We left some in for the female to continue guarding. The fry were easy to raise on micro worms and baby brine shrimp. The only problem we cmae across with the fry is the usual fry intolerance to poor water quality. They fry were raised in the smae water as the parents which is medium hard with Ph of 7.2-7.4.

Since that first spawn we have had several successful spawns so that we now have a good quantity of youngs. As a matter of fact, we had so many fry around that we have left the last spawn with the female for the past three weeks. They are growing nicely and the female has been able t protect them from the rasboras with very few casualities. The only difficulty was that she decided to take after the make. This is common practice with Apisto females however so we simply separated him from the rest of the tank. If you are one of those hobbyists like us who have looked for Apistos for a while and even failed at keeping some of the other species give this one a try. They are available and will give your ego a boost when they spawn.

P.V.A.S. AUCTION - SUNDAY. NOV. 2

RULES FOR THE SELLER:

- 1. You do not have to be a member of PVAS to buy or sell hobby-related items, including fish, plants, equipment etc.
- 2. Registration of items for the auction will begin at 9 am and will end promptly at 12:00 noon on Sunday,
- 3. Auction will start at 11 am while registration is still in progress.
- 4. All items MUST be labeled with identity of contents, number in bag, sex (if possible) and other pertinent data Use a permanent ink marker or adhesive label. Labeling equipment will be available at the auction, but labeling must be accomplished before the items will be registered.
 - a. Fish: "Pair" means one of each sex. "Mated Pair" means a pair that have spawned WITH EACH OTHER. "Trio" means one male and two females. "Reverse Trio" means two males and one female. "Mixed sexes" means at least one specimen of each sex. If uncertain, the bag should be marked "Unsexed".
 - b. Supplies: All aquarium equipment MUST be labeled as to working condition. (i.e. it must be stated if a tank leaks or is broken).
- 5. Proper fish bags MUST be used. Live items must be bagged with ample air and water. Fish packed in "Baggies" or similar bags will NOT be registered. If a fish is registered in a tank or bowl, the container will be considered part of the item and it will be auctioned as a unit. After registration, the Auction Committee reserve the right to re-bag any live item as is necessary.
- 6. Registration is limited to fifteen (15) items per person. There will be no exceptions.
- 7. A limit of five (5) bags per species or color form/variety is allowed unless prior approval is given by the Auction Chairman.
- 8. For every five (5) items placed in the auction, one (1) colored sticker will be given to the seller to attach to the item of his choice. These items will be sold first at the auction.
- 9. Bags will be offered "as is" and will be sold as an item. Once registered, the contents of the bag may not be split.
- 10. Each item carries a \$1.00 minimum, unless the seller assigns a higher minimum. The seller may lower the minimum on an item that does not move during the auction.
- 11. No payment will be made to seller on the day of the auction. Payment will be forwarded by mail within ten (10) days after the auction date. It is the responsibility of the SELLER to be sure P.V.A.S. has their proper name and address to receive payment. Envelopes for this purpose will be filled out at the registration desk.
- 12. The seller recrive 2/3 of the selling pirce, PVAS retains 1/3.
- 13. All items not sold must be claimed at the end of the auction or they will be disposed of at the Auction Chairman's discretion.
- 14. Auctioneer retains the right to set aside improperly bagged or marked item, or any sick fish or otherwise unsaleable item.
- 15. Fish species that are restricted by either Federal or State statute will not be accepted. These include, but are not limited to: Piranhas, Texas Cichlids and Walking Catfish.



SPONGE FILTERS: JUNGLE GOLDFISH vs TETRA BRILLANT A Personal Evaluation by Pete Thrift, PVAS

Shortly after my entrance into the hobby, and after killing more fish than I care to admit to, I became aware of the necessity of biological filtration and regular partial water changes. My first serious interest was in the raising of fancy goldfish, which I was told are more tolerant of poor water management. This is true, but only to a point. Once that point is reached, goldfish are not "more tolerant", they just take longer to die. And with goldfish, that point is reached more quickly than most hobbyists realize. Goldfish produce considerably more waste products per inch of body length than almost any other aquarium fish, including most larger cichlids. They are proof of what FAMA columnist Paul Speice has been preaching for years — the capacity of an aquarium is determined by "pounds of fish, not inches of fish".

My first attempts at biological filtration used undergravel filters. These filters performed well at first, but rather quickly became overwhelmed by tank waste load, even with weekly gravel vacuumings and partial water changes. I found myself tearing down my tanks several times a year to clean under the filter plates. So I replaced my undergravel filters with internal sponge filters, which could be easily removed for cleaning.

There are three major manufacturers offering air-driven sponge filters to American hobbyists - Aquarium Products, Jungle, and Tetra. Only Jungle and Tetra are widely available in the PVAS area. The Jungle filters are round, triangular, square, or cloverleaf-shaped foam around a weighted plastic center with a small, short clear lift tube. The Tetra filters are cylinders of foam around an L-shaped green lift tube, with a return elbow which can be extended to the water surface, and suction cups to attach the filter to the tank wall. I chose Jungle because they were cheaper and could be concealed in the tank gravel, but I kept wondering whether they offered the best filtering performance.

Some months ago, I decided to perform a comparison test between the Jungle and Tetra filters. To keep the test simple and the results easily measured, I would equate biologicial filtration performance with mechanical filtration performance — the more waste collected in the sponge, the better the filter performed both mechanically and biologically. This isn't necessarily true for power filters with high flow rates, but I believe it is valid for these air—driven filters with their low flow rates.

I set up a fifteen gallon tank with both a Jungle Goldfish model filter and a Tetra Brillant (yes, that is the correct spelling) model. Both filters were newly purchased for this test. Each filter was driven from its own outlet on a Whisper 800 air pump so that equal volumes of air were going to each filter. The tank was deliberately overstocked with seven adolescent fantail goldfish fed twice daily. Once per week, each filter was rinsed in its own one gallon bucket filled with tap water, and the tank floor was vacuumed as part of a 30% water change. The water in each bucket was allowed to settle for several hours, and then the amount of sediment at the bottom of each white bucket was compared. I ran this test for eight weeks, varying equally each week the amount of air going to each filter. After four weeks the filter and outlet combinations were reversed to further insure equal air flow rates.

In every case, the Tetra filter outperformed the Jungle filter, despite a much lower manufacturer capacity rating (20 gallons for the Tetra, up to 100 gallons for the Jungle). Each time, there appeared to be almost twice the waste and sediment in the Tetra bucket as in the Jungle bucket. I am the first to admit that this was not a very scientific test, but I believe its conclusion to be true: the Tetra filter design is considerably more effective than the Jungle design.

I believe there are two reasons for the above conclusion. First, I think the Jungle design permits water to either bypass the foam filter block around the weighted center, or be drawn into the lift tube around the air supply tube and bypassing the filter body altogether. Secondly, the Tetra's much longer lift tube and directional return elbow makes it much less likely that filtered water will be immediately redrawn into the filter.

By the way, I learned during this test that it is very easy to overdrive the small diameter lift tubes of these filters. More air is not always desirable. Raise the lift tube about half an inch above the water surface for observation, and vary the air input to obtain the greatest water flow. If your air pump is large enough, you will find an air level beyond which the water flow will decrease because air is beginning to completely fill the lift tube and less water suction is occurring.

All of this is not to say that the Jungle filter is a bad product, because it isn't. There must be tens of thousands of hobbyists successfully filtering their tanks with Jungle filters. But in my opinion, the Tetra filter is a much more efficient filter, and this efficiency is well worth the additional cost of this filter and its visibility when viewing the tank.
